FROM THE DESK OF THE INCUMBENT

Embracing the Seasons of Faith

As we come to the close of another summer, the changing seasons offer us a moment to reflect on the passage of time, both in nature and in our spiritual lives. The warmth of the sun, the beauty of long days, and the opportunities for rest and renewal that summer brings are now fading, making way for the cooler breezes and the approaching rhythm of fall.

Métis Sash Displayed at St. George's

In October, 2023, the Rev. Deacon Tanis Kolisnyk visited St. George's to preach on Indigenous issues and the path to reconciliation.

As she left us that day, she gifted the parish a Métis scarf, sharing that displaying the scarf in the church signifies an openness and welcoming to Indigenous peoples. St. George's eagerly accepted this gift and, following consultation, decided to place the scarf on the lectern to be visible for all to see.

In the days after, it was noted that the scarf at the lectern would be visible only if one were in the church building; for those passing by the church, there would be no symbol the parish was welcoming to Indigenous peoples. Following a discussion at a meeting of Worship Committee in November, 2023, it was agreed a second Métis sash would be purchased so that one could be prominently displayed and seen by passers-by. Discussions were undertaken with various individuals and groups as to the placement of this second sash. In the end, it was agreed it would be displayed in the "birdcage window". Brenda Cotton provided suggestions for placement, recognizing she regularly updates the birdcage window to reflect activities throughout the church year. Brent Cotton was also consulted, representing the Design Committee, who joined with Sheryl Thomson in determining placement and the method to display the scarf.

In early September, the original sash was relocated from the lectern and hung in the "birdcage window" facing out onto Wilton Street to show St. George's as a welcoming place for all, especially our Indigenous sisters and brothers; the newly purchased sash was placed on the lectern.

Appreciation and thanks are extended to Brenda Cotton, Brent Cotton and Sheryl Thomson for their work in supporting this further step in our journey of reconciliation.

FINANCE REPORT

The Net Loss to August 2024 is \$61 533. This is Favourable (F) to Budget but slightly Unfavourable (U) to last year.

Fundraising is \$1135 U. Concerts is unfavourable due to less activity than budgeted and Dinners is unfavourable due to an accrual issue that should be adjusted with the Review.

Interest Earned is \$3854U to Budget. This is timing and less investments.

Identified Giving is \$3527 F to Budget but \$918 U to last year.

Sundry Rentals is \$4485 F due to more ad hoc events e.g. movies

Administrative Assistant Payroll Benefits are \$740 U. This is more benefits taken.

Rector's Living Allowance and Stipend are offsets.

Rector's Payroll Benefits are \$1054 U. This is underbudgeted.

Music Director is \$993 U due to the overlap between Rick and Julian

Music Director Payroll Benefits is \$894 U as we didn't budget for Julian to be an employee.

General Maintenance is \$1633 F. This is timing.

Security and Fire Detection is \$857 F. This is timing.

Utilities – Gas is \$8770F. This is timing and ongoing commodity rate decreases.

The chequing account is reconciled to August 31, 2024.

Changes in Designated Funds > \$500:

There were no changes > \$500.

There have been two transfers from RBC investments to TD chequing for cash flow (pay bills): \$15,000 on August 15 and \$10,000 on September 16.

The auditors are concluding their 2023 Review. They expect to submit a draft later soon.

The Prayer Box: We pray weekly for some people who need those extra prayers, and we call out their names. We are also looking for a few more people to pray for those on the private prayer list. If you have some moments during the day or evening, please consider this important ministry.

Community Support: St. George's has supported West Broadway/1Just City for many years. Things that are always needed: coffee, sugar, coffee whitener, common spices and seasonings, metal forks/soup spoons (used is fine - no plastic), regular size mugs (used is fine), baking powder, muffin liner cups, shampoos and conditioners. Cupcake papers, cake mixes and spices are always needed at West Broadway. Your empty travel-sized containers are needed too!

We will also deliver non-perishable food items to **Epiphany Indigenous Anglican**. Please bring in any of the following canned items: vegetables, juice, soup, fruit, Kraft dinner, pasta, pasta sauce, stews, baby formula/food or boxed cereal/instant oatmeal. Our work with Epiphany is a new initiative, part of our reconciliation activities.

All items can be placed in baskets at the back of the church and, after blessing, will be delivered to either WB or Epiphany. Your ongoing support is very much appreciated!

Mission & Ministry is now supporting a neighbourhood seniors programs that runs at St. Matthew's Anglican. We are requesting monetary donations to help with the costs of this program. Mark your cheque "St. Matthew's Seniors". Tax receipts will be issued for all donations. The program takes place on 3 Mondays per month, for 9 months of the year. It is a drop in which provides coffee, tea, snacks, card games, conversation and some craft activities. St. Paul's Anglican (Fort Garry) also supports this program with volunteers. Our own Rev. Peter is also involved.

Thanks to all those who organized, set up, grilled, served, cleaned up, and attended our Fall BBQ on October 6. It was an enjoyable fellowship event.




